



## Now for the East end

*How can our building best serve our mission?*

**Revd Lore Chumbley writes:**

Please pray for discernment as we reach the next stage of our reordering process. From Ascension to Pentecost, we at Christ Church have been united with the world wide church in praying for the coming of the Holy Spirit and for the coming of God's kingdom. As Pentecost passes it's important we don't forget those prayers. They are at the heart of all our worship, made explicit in the prayer Our Lord

taught us: "Your kingdom come, Your will be done."

After four years of prayer, discussion, experiment and thought we are coming to the end of our deliberations about the reordering of the East end of Christ Church. Underpinning the process has been the question "What is God's will for Christ Church? How do we live that out in our worship, in our relationships and in our use of our building?" Since Christmas we have experimented with four different arrangements of the choir and communion table. Over the next few weeks we will also be thinking about the pulpit and the communion rail. Then we will meet together at the beginning of July to review our responses and to discern our way forward.

In all this we need energy, insight and sensitivity to each other's needs. But most of all we need the power of the Holy Spirit. A year ago, as I joined you in the process, we used a prayer for the discernment of God's will. Please would you pray that prayer with us over the next month in order that we may discern and live out the will of God in our church.

### **Will Willans, our Tower Captain and Ringing Master, writes:**

These happy people are the ringers on Easter Sunday, members and friends of the “Society of Christ Church Youths”, which has maintained ringing for service every week since the new bells were installed.

Which is fine, but what do we do up there in the tower – “heard but not seen”? Well, the English art of ringing comprises:

- “Handling” – the first skill to be learned, managing the rope so that the bell is under control;
- “Rounds” – the bells ringing in sequence down the scale. Taking a bell in rounds is the next step for a learner, and anyone who can ring in good rounds is a useful ringer;
- “Call-changes” – changing the sequence from rounds by words of command;
- “Change-ringing” – the sequence continually changing to the rules of a “method”.

And the way to find out more is to visit when we ring. Access is up to the gallery and through a door in the wall; our Sunday ringing is 9:15 to 10:00; and we practise on Saturday mornings, 9:30 to 11:00, generally followed by coffee – and cake – in the church.

# Manchester bombing

## **A short reflection from Bishop Peter in the light of the Manchester attack**

Not just in Britain or Europe but around the world vigils have been held to remember all those whose lives have been touched by the tragic event at Manchester Arena on Monday night, 22 May.

People have gathered in public places, in homes and at work, in churches and cathedrals to remember all those whose lives have been turned upside down by violence.

People of all nationalities, ages and creeds have come together in a shared longing for peace and justice in our world.

But underneath the shock and anger and grief there has been a determination by the people of Manchester to stand together, to support those most affected and to unite across their diversity. They have resolved to rebuild and repair the damage to their city and to face down the fear that terrorists seek to instil in our lives.

Incidents like this raise many questions, including the question "Where is God in the midst of all this?" At moments like this I am reminded of something which I read many years ago and has remained with me: "In Jesus, God did not come to explain suffering, or to remove it, but to fill it with his presence." In this life we may not get all the answers we seek to the pain and problem of suffering. We live in a world which continues to be torn apart by suffering in many ways. But I believe we live in a world which is held and shaped by the love and light of God. Jesus came to fill the world with his presence.

Let us make that the focus of our prayers.

# New Archdeacon of Wells



On Saturday 20 May the Revd Canon Anne Gell was installed as Archdeacon of Wells and Residuary Canon of Wells Cathedral by the Rt Revd Peter Hancock, Bishop of Bath and Wells. Archdeacon Anne was previously Vicar of St Peter's Wrecclesham in the Diocese of Guildford, Area Dean of Farnham, and Honorary Canon of Guildford Cathedral. Before ordination, she read *Pure Mathematics* at Oxford before training to be a GP. She has spoken fondly of the "beauty" found in mathematical models, which she says "point profoundly towards God in the universe." As a former doctor, she has a strong interest in medicine and healing in its broadest sense.

# Bishop's Message for June

As you read this one of the issues dominating the news will be the General Election. Some wit once said: "If you don't vote, you get the government you deserve, and if you do, you never get the results you expected." Witty that may be, but it is also somewhat cynical and it is one of the things our Archbishops have warned us against. In a Pastoral Letter released to all parishes and chaplaincies they have said that the

first obligation we have as Christians is to pray for the election and to recognise the very real burdens and responsibilities carried by those in political life and their families. The second obligation they suggest is to set aside apathy and cynicism and to renew our commitment to the virtues of love, trust and hope in God and in each other. These virtues they suggest should guide and judge our own actions and shape and determine the life of our nation.

Faithful, humble, trusting prayer is one mark of true discipleship and I hope that many of us will be engaging in the opportunities to pray with others between Ascension and Pentecost. If we do we will be praying with millions of other Christians across the world, praying that many more people, among them our own friends and families, will discover and open their lives to the love of Jesus Christ. Services are being held in Bath Abbey on Thursday 25 May and in the Cathedral on Sunday 4 June. At Bath Abbey there will be interactive prayer stations, mixing traditional and contemporary worship, and at the Cathedral there will be a Prayer Fayre. We are all invited to take part and to pray together expectantly for the empowering of the Holy Spirit. Come and join your bishops in praying: "Thy Kingdom Come".

# This month's charity: Fairy Bricks

*Fairy Bricks has a special connection with Christ Church: one of its keenest fundraisers is Dianne Davis's granddaughter Tatiana, who loves Lego and relished playing with sets provided by Fairy Bricks while in hospital for cancer treatment.*

Fairy Bricks has one very simple objective:

to give Lego to children in hospital. Play is a vital part of the recovery process when children are in hospital. It provides comfort and distraction

and is even used as an educational tool by Play Specialists to assist children with procedures they have to endure.

Lego itself as a product is perfect for this. It is something many children are already familiar with and can provide an instant escape at a very difficult time. Then by its very nature when tomorrow comes it can be rebuilt to help the same child with something else or move to another child to start the process all over again.

From humble beginnings and a single hospital donation in 2012, the charity now aim to deliver Lego with a retail value of approximately £5,000 per month throughout the UK and sometimes beyond. In the later half of 2017 they are hoping to increase that to £7,500 of sets each and every month.

# About Christ Church

*We're a liberal, inclusive and open church,  
seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty  
in our faith and doubt, and support in our community*

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the normal Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our

robed choir and organist. There is the option of separate activities for children in Junior Church groups during our 10am Sunday service.

As well as worship on Sunday and Thursday mornings, there are many other activities going on in our community. We support the Genesis Sunday Centre and have our own community café. The musical tradition of the church continues to thrive, and we have an active choir; new singers of all ages are always very welcome. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting.
