



## Looking outwards for Lent

*Holy Week with Revd Canon David Bruno*


From time to time I come across locals who have never been inside Christ Church or, worse, don't realise that it is an open building containing a living church. The glass doors of our new entrance lobby have been a real help with this. People walk past, glance in and become curious, often culminating in a visit to the church when we are open for the Cedar Tree café.

The theme of Our Lord reaching out to and including outsiders is one which Luke's Gospel returns to over and over again. We see "outsiders" – the poor, widows, the sick, tax collectors, Samaritans and even children – become "insiders" as he speaks to them, accepts them and heals them. One of the recurring problems in the Anglican Communion is how to keep our churches from becoming a club for "insiders", and instead to keep our attention turned not just inward to our worship but also outward to our community.

This year we have invited a visitor to join us for Holy Week, help lead our worship and turn our thoughts outwards. Canon David Bruno is a retired priest who now lives in Yorkshire but has spent most of his long life ministering in unfamiliar places. It started when he was finishing his formation in King's College London and wondering where to spend his curacy. His contemporaries were finding posts in and around London but to everyone's surprise David felt called to the North of England and took a post in Darlington.

This was in the early days of the Clean Air Act and the North was still a place of "dark Satanic mills" to southerners. After his ministry in Yorkshire, David was invited to join the former Bishop of Ripon in South Africa, where he combined chaplaincy at a boys' school

▶ with a cathedral post. A second post as chaplain in Rhodesia followed.

Returning home, he still felt himself to be a member of the worldwide Anglican communion. He joined the board of Mission for Scotland and travelled as their overseas chaplain. His areas of responsibility included India, South America and the middle East.

Recalled to Southern Africa as director of the Provincial Department of Mission covering the diocese of Namibia, David became Dean of the Anglican cathedral in Windhoek, where Jude Bishop was his secretary and David Bishop the cathedral organist. After six years in Namibia he returned to Britain, married Maggie and became rector of Christ Church, Falkirk in Scotland. After nine years in Scotland they have now retired to Yorkshire, where both remain indefatigably busy. David is Bishop's Chaplain for Retired Clergy and Widows in the SW Ripon area, and he and Maggie spend time and energy supporting refugees in Bradford.


After a lifetime of "looking outwards", David will be with us during Holy Week to help us to turn our thoughts and attention to the wider community. He will speak about his experiences of the refugee crisis in India on the Tuesday evening of Holy Week in a talk entitled "The crucifixion didn't take place in a church", and lead a Bible study on the afternoon of Maundy Thursday. # Around the building



For much of February, the choir had to share the chancel space with scaffolding, in place to enable the organ builders to strip out the organ pipes damaged by falling plaster. In fact they removed much more of the organ in order to make room for the builders to come in and strip the east wall. The scaffolding is gone now and work will pause while the wall stabilises, until the organ builders are available again to continue the organ repair. We have received a faculty (the C of E counterpart of Listed Buildings Consent) for the full programme of refurbishment, but how much of it we can achieve will depend on fundraising...

Meanwhile, we're all invited to vote on three final designs to go on the glass of our entrance doors – both a safety requirement and one of the first things visitors to Christ Church will see...

# Bishop's Message for March

## *Making space*



**From the Rt Revd Peter Hancock,  
Bishop of Bath and Wells**

I remember my father once saying “As you get older the seconds seem longer, but the years go by faster.” I think he was right. Perhaps that’s your experience too? In March 2014 I officially became the Bishop of Bath and Wells and began to “take up the reins”, and it’s two years since I was appointed the Lead Bishop for Safeguarding. The time has flown by. Even more amazing is that this year I shall have been ordained for 38 years, and I thank God for all that he has enabled me to see and do through those years. In my study there’s a picture of a much-younger me, taken at my ordination in 1980. Looking at it reminds me of the Lord’s grace and goodness to me and to Jane through those years.

I will be taking some study leave in May and June this year. At one time these were called “sabbaticals”, and that word is from the same root as “Sabbath”, which means to take time to rest. I am particularly grateful to Bishop Ruth and the Bishop’s Staff, who have encouraged me to take this time, especially as it will mean they will have to “keep an eye on the shop”.

This will give me an opportunity to spend time reading and reflecting on what God may be saying about the priorities and opportunities for the diocese and the wider Church – and time to pray and think more about the challenges which lie ahead of us. During this time Jane and I have arranged to go to Israel. Neither of us has been there before, and that in itself will be a wonderful experience.

In the midst of busy, noisy and often crowded lives it is hard at times to make space to read and to pray, to make time to listen to God and to build our relationship with him. I am sure that having this precious gift of time will mean that I return renewed and refreshed for all that lies ahead as together we seek to live and tell the story of Jesus.

Taking care of our spiritual lives is something we all need to do, and Jesus took time to be apart with his Heavenly Father. I know not everyone can take study leave, but even a half day will often help to charge the “spiritual batteries”. I look forward to sharing with you some of what I have learnt when I get back to the desk.

## This month's charity: Burlington House

*The loose collection in the plate on Sunday 11 March, plus an optional retiring collection for the rest of March, will go to Burlington House, run by DHI in Burlington Street. (Donations in collection envelopes will continue to go to Christ Church.)*

Burlington House, an abstinence-based supported house in Burlington Street, near Christ Church, is a unique and cost-effective supported dry house. As well as offering a highly affordable alternative to residential or hospital detox rehab, at a cost approximately ten times less than such traditional rehab facilities, the 11-bedroom shared house enables people to consolidate their recovery within their community.

Burlington House is a unique detox and supported housing project that supports vulnerable (often but not necessarily homeless) adults to overcome drug and/or alcohol dependency and to make a full and sustained recovery in the community. Approximately 70% of beneficiaries leave drug/alcohol free and successfully move on to independent lives. This compares to 20-60% success rate for residential rehab. A whopping 80% of our

residents are in employment, training, education and/or volunteering when they leave.

Developing Health and Independence (formerly known as the Drugs and Homeless Initiative) is a local charity set up in 1999 to help people out of the cycle of homelessness, social isolation and drug or alcohol abuse. Our aim is to offer people a wide range of services that help them gain control of their lives again and live independently.

Last year Christ Church supported the organisation's appeal to raise £155,000 to buy the property in Burlington Street outright and safeguard its long-term use for vulnerable and homeless drug/alcohol users in Bath who wish to turn their lives around. We now have an opportunity to contribute to the continuing operation of Burlington House.

# About Christ Church

*We're a liberal, inclusive and open church,  
seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty  
in our faith and doubt, and support in our community*

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the normal Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our

robed choir and organist. There is the option of separate activities for children in Junior Church groups during our 10am Sunday service.

As well as worship on Sunday and Thursday mornings, there are many other activities going on in our community. We support the Genesis Sunday Centre and have our own community café. The musical tradition of the church continues to thrive, and we have an active choir; new singers of all ages are always very welcome. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting.
