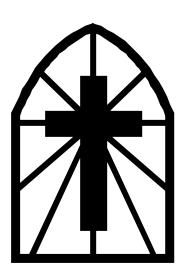

# ADVENT IS NOT JUST FOR CHRISTMAS

Advent is the beginning of the year for most churches in the Western tradition. It begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, which is the Sunday nearest November 30, and ends on Christmas Eve If Christmas Eve is a Sunday, it is counted as the fourth Sunday of Advent, with Christmas Eve proper beginning at sunset.

Historically, the colour of Advent is purple, the colour of royalty to welcome the Advent of the King. The purple of Advent is also the colour of suffering used during Lent and Holy Week. This points to an important connection between Jesus' birth and death. The nativity, the Incarnation, cannot be separated from the crucifixion, the Atonement. The purpose of Jesus' coming into the world, of the "Word made flesh" and dwelling among us, is to reveal God and His grace to the world through Jesus' life and teaching, but also through his suffering, death, and resurrection.

The word Advent means "coming" or "arrival." The focus of the entire season is the celebration of the birth of Jesus the Christ in his First Advent, and the anticipation of the return of Christ the King in his Second Advent. And so, Advent is far more than the marking a 2,000-year-old event in history. It is a celebration of a truth about God, the revelation of God in Christ through which all of creation might be reconciled to God. That is a process in which we now participate, and the consummation of which we anticipate. Scripture readings for Advent will reflect this emphasis on the Second Advent, including themes of accountability for faithfulness at His coming, judgment on sin, and the hope of eternal life.

In this double focus on past and future, Advent also symbolises the spiritual journey of individuals and of all of us as a congregation, as we declare that Christ has come, that He is present in the world



today, and that He will come again in power. That declaration provides a basis for the ethics of the Kingdom, for holy living arising from a profound sense that we live "between the times" and are called to be faithful stewards of what is entrusted to us as God's people. So, as a church we celebrate

God's entrance into history in the Incarnation, and anticipate a future consummation of that history for which "all creation is groaning and is awaiting its redemption," we also confess our own responsibility as a people commissioned to "love the Lord our God with all our heart" and to "love our neighbour as ourselves."

This will be the theme of our Advent Carol Service on Sunday 30 November at 6.30 pm. The readings from scripture will be those which, from the earliest pages of the Old Testament through to the final parts of the New Testament, speak of the continuity of God's love from his promise of the Messiah, to the manager at Bethlehem and then in the revelation of the Second Coming. Favourite Advent hymns, and carefully chosen choral pieces will complete something which will be the true starting point of all our Christmas celebrations.

However, there may be members of the congregation who would like to train as a visitor and give help in the diocese. If you think you have some thing to offer – and you need not be a financial expert – please speak to Antony who will be pleased to help you explore the possibilities.

# **Caring for Seafarers at Christmas**

Shipping, on which we depend for many of our daily needs, is a 24-hour, 365-days-a-year business. The world's merchant fleet consists of over 44,000 ships carrying more than 90% of world trade. The 1.2 million merchant seafarers come from many nations, the majority being from South-East Asia.

Some of them can go for years without getting home for Christmas, and, whether at sea or in Port, they all suffer from home sickness as they think of their families celebrating without them.

Christmas Services are at the heart of all the Mission's celebrations, and the Chaplains try to include hymns and carols from different parts of the world at services in their own Chapels. Great efforts are also made to take visiting seafarers to worship at local Churches of their own nationalities and denominations if at all possible. In Rotterdam, the Chaplain took a group of Polish Sailors to the Polish Roman Catholic Church, and Croats and Filipinos attended the Midnight Mass. A Polish Shipmaster in the Medway in Kent asked the Mission Chaplain for wafers which would be broken and exchanged as a Christian sign of peace at the start of the Polish Christmas meal, and happily the Priest at the local RC Church was able to help with this request. In Walvis Bay, Namibia, the Centre served 70 Christmas Dinners, and visited every ship to give a present to each crewmember. In Richards Bay, South Africa, the Chaplain took gifts to all the seafarers in Port, visiting 19 vessels, and distributing about 450 presents. Donated gifts were also distributed to the Captain and Crew of a Container Ship in Hong Kong.

These are just a few of the many ways the Mission works, and more can be found in the latest article on the Church Noticeboard. So, as we hold our own celebrations in Christ Church this year, let us remember the Seamen who will not be home for Christmas, and offer a prayer for those who are trying to make their lives just a little more bearable.

Meals and gifts are also provided for those who go to the Julian House Night Shelter in the city centre.

# Put the 'W' in Christmas

A mother recalls the poignancy of seeing her son in the school's Carol Service. It's a message we might care to take to heart this Christmas.

That December, I had vowed to make Christmas a calm and peaceful experience. I had cut back on nonessential things - extensive card writing, endless baking, decorating, and even overspending. Yet still, I found myself exhausted, unable to appreciate the precious family moments, and of course, the true meaning of Christmas.

My son, Nicholas, was a very excited six year old. For weeks he'd been learning songs for his school's Carol Service. I didn't have the heart to tell him I wouldn't be there because I was working. Unwilling to miss his shining moment, I spoke to his teacher. She assured me there'd be a dress rehearsal and all parents unable to attend on the evening would be made welcome. Fortunately, Nicholas seemed happy with the compromise. So, on the morning of the dress rehearsal, I arrived ten minutes early, found a spot near the front and sat down. Around the room, I saw several other parents. Then the children came in class by class, and sat down cross-legged on the floor near the front. Each group rose to perform their song. I didn't expect anything other than seasonal fun, I suppose, so when my son's class stood to sing, 'Christmas Love', I was slightly taken aback by its bold title.

Nicholas was aglow, as were all of his classmates, dressed in fuzzy mittens, red sweaters with bright bobble hats on their heads. He was one of the children chosen for the front row, and given large letters to hold up, one by one, to spell out the title of the song. As the class sang 'C is for Christmas', a child would hold up the letter C. Then, 'H is for Happy', and on and on, until each child holding up his portion had presented the complete message, 'Christmas Love'.

The performance was going smoothly, until suddenly, we noticed that Nicholas, in the front row, was holding the letter 'M' upside down - totally unaware that his letter 'M' appeared as a 'W'. Several children began to giggle at his mistake, but Nicholas had no idea they were laughing at him, and so he stood tall, proudly holding his 'W'. Then the last letter was raised, and we all saw the words the letters now made. With tears in my eyes I stared at what my son had done. He had reminded us all why we were there celebrating in the first place. For when the last letter was held high, the message read loud and clear: 'CHRISTWAS LOVE'.

And, I believe, He still is. This is why I can say **Happy Christmas** to everyone.

# The church calendar

# CHRIST CHURCH, JULIAN ROAD DIOCESE OF BATH AND WELLS IN THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND

#### PAST HISTORY

Christ Church was built at the end of the 18th Century by the socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship by the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church of that time to provide seating free of charge. Early supporters included the Archbishops of Canterbury and York; the great evangelical campaigner against slavery, William Wilberforce; Philip Pusey, the father of E B Pusey; and Martin Stafford Smith, the godfather of John Keble, who were both founders of the Oxford Movement. The building was designed by the famous Bath architect John Palmer, who was responsible for the completion of the Great Pump Room, Lansdown Crescent and St Swithin's, the parish church of Walcot. In November 1998, the congregation, friends and well-wishers from all over the world celebrated the bicentenary.

#### MINISTRY

Christ Church is unusual in not being a parish church. Much of the vitality of its life and worship derives from the fact that the congregation comes from all areas of the city and the surrounding districts. Whilst there is no full-time paid vicar, there is a non-stipendiary priest-in-charge, who leads a ministerial team of ordained and lay people. Worship at Christ Church largely reflects the traditions of those responsible for its foundation and the rich diversity of the Church of England as a whole. Thus, preaching and Bible-based teaching is firmly set within a liturgical setting which is best described as liberal and catholic.

#### SERVICES

The 8am Holy Communion is either Book of Common Prayer (1662) or Common Worship. At 10am the Family Eucharist is celebrated according to Common Worship. On the first Sunday of each month, there is a full Choral Evensong. A more informal discussion-based service is held on the third Sunday of the month. A Junior Church and a Crêche cater for the children and young people who attend the 10am service. At festivals such as Easter, Christmas, Mothering Sunday and Harvest, our special services, designed for the whole family, are very popular.

There are a variety of mid-week activities including Holy Communion at 11am every Thursday (with lunch on the first and third weeks of the month). The notice board and the weekly notice sheet provide details of discussion and prayer groups which are held at different times throughout the year. An all-age choir, which rehearses on Friday evenings, maintains the much-admired music tradition at Christ Church.
