Forum...

It has been remarked that October is a funny month; the month when the ardent cricket fan realises that his wife left him in May. This year I doubt that this is so. Wives, partners, whole families previously immune



from the game have been following the fortunes of England in the latest Test series. And we won the Ashes!

Over the years, many clergy, when explaining a summer absence from the pulpit, have been grateful for the phonetic confusion of the words "Lourdes" and "Lords". And it goes further even than that. The distinguished cricket journalist Sir Neville Cardus wrote, "For your good cricketer the ends of the earth have come to a resting-point at Lord's, and wherever he may be at the fall of a summer's day his face should turn religiously to Lord's". However, this sentiment would not have the approval of Archbishop Temple who actively dissuaded clergy playing a game which he described as "organized loafing".



The Archbishop would certainly find himself at odds with those who believe cricket to be a metaphor for life. And yet, if we accept this metaphor, we might say that this summer's test matches were a representation of life at its best. The standards of sportsmanship on the part of both teams were exemplary. And what will remain with me is the

image of an English bowler comforting an Australian batsman in our high moment of victory. Later the two teams enjoyed a party together. England, modest in victory, gave Australian dignity in their defeat.

History is full of the dangerous consequences of depriving the vanquished of their freedom and dignity. It is generally thought that the seeds of the Second World War were sown in the crippling and humiliating reparations imposed on Germany at Versailles in 1918. The treaty was so harsh that it created smouldering resentment. It was this national humiliation that led to the rise of Hitler and a second bid by Germany for European domination. In our time, this raises questions about the resolution of the conflict in Iraq and in other places.

What do we do when the fighting is over? How do we enable broken and divided countries to resume their places within the family of the nations.

Post – apartheid South Africa based its rebuilding of the nation state on the realistic principle that national reconciliation does not mean forgetting the sufferings or negating the sacrifices.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu, formerly chairman of South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission, says to forgive goes beyond the smiling unselfish devotion to the cause of others. He adds, "to forgive is a process that does not exclude hate and anger. These emotions are all part of being human." Tutu continues, "You should never hate yourself for hating others who do terrible things; the depth of your love is shown by the extent of your anger."

This great humanitarian and spiritual pioneer then goes on to remind us of our Christian responsibility to move from anger to forgiveness. "When I talk of forgiveness, I mean the belief that you can come out the other side a better person. A better person than the one being consumed by anger and hatred." This implies that both the forgiven and those who forgive should be able to become equal partners in a restored world. Thus united they might listen to what God has to say: -

"For he will speak peace to his people.... Steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss each other. Faithfulness will spring up from the ground, and righteousness will look down from the sky. The LORD will give what is good, and our land will yield its increase." (Psalm 85)

Our Calendar Correspondent Explains... "Martin Luther" (31st October)

Martin Luther was a German theologian, an Augustinian monk, and an ecclesiastical reformer whose teachings inspired the Reformation and deeply influenced the doctrines

and culture of the Lutheran and Protestant traditions. Luther's call to the Church to return to the teachings of the Bible led to the formation of new traditions within Christianity and to the Counter-Reformation, the Roman Catholic reaction to these movements.

Luther's contributions to Western civilization went beyond the life of the Christian Church. Luther's translations of the Bible helped to develop a standard version of the German language and added several principles to the art of translation. Luther's hymns inspired the development of congregational singing in Christianity. His marriage on June 13, 1525, to Katharina von Bora began a movement of clerical marriage within many Christian traditions.

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WORLD MENTAL HEALTH DAY

When is it? Monday, October 10th

What is it? A day to highlight the worldwide problem of mental illness.

Why does it matter? Mental ill health is a major global concern. According to the World Health Organisation it is projected to reach 15% or the global burden of disease by the year 2020, by which time depression will disable many more people than AIDS, traffic accidents, heart diseases and war combined.

Too often, people who are mentally ill are shunned by others who are afraid of them, or isolated from the community for their own protection. Even now, some mentally ill people, in countries such as India and Ghana, may be kept in chains and denied their basic human rights. Throughout the centuries, people have been feared and mocked, or even regarded as evil spirits. Such was the attitude when Jesus was on earth. He recognised their isolation, spoke to them without fear, and was able to calm their troubled spirits. We pray for that same healing influence now, on all who suffer from sickness of the mind and for those who have become victims of mentally disturbed people.

How BasicNeeds is helping the mentally ill in developing countries. The charity BasicNeeds works specifically with mentally ill people in developing countries, where there is a clear link between poverty and mental illness. The first essential is for people to be seen by a mental health professional, ensuring that they get the right medication – an opportunity that many have never had before, because they live in isolated areas and are too poor to travel. BasicNeeds and its local partners organise rural health clinics, where mentally ill people can be diagnosed and treated locally by visiting psychiatrists.

BasicNeeds also helps provide employment opportunities, so that once stabilised, mentally ill people can contribute to the family income, for instance through horticultural projects, and begin to overcome the stigma that their illness attracts. Many others, once treated, are able to return to their former jobs. This has a knock-on benefit for carers, many of whom are children, and for other family members.

Please remember in your prayers mentally ill people worldwide and those who are working to help them.

Farewell to Laurie Ferguson

"Have a good life: live it to the full"

Family and friends gathered at Christ Church on September to say goodbye to Laurie Ferguson. Laurie was a member of Christ Church choir for some 20 years and his funeral service was full of the music he loved.

Speaking on behalf of the family, Laurie's son John spoke of his father as a man for whom his wife Jean of 52 years and their children were a great and enduring passion. John recalled that he was always a source of calm and helpful advice and was hugely generous with both his time and money. He created several beautiful gardens which were perfect for children to play in. Born in Yorkshire, the son of a miner, Laurie worked hard to win his way to grammar school and later to university. He became recognised as a talented teacher of chemistry both in schools and finally at the College of Education based at Newton Park. Laurie had a great love of the arts, especially music. He played the cello as a young man and encouraged all his children to play an instrument. He also loved the written word and his houseful of books was, said John, "a fantastic resource for his children's' growing minds.

Not many of us at Christ Church knew of Laurie's taste for fast cars and motorbikes. For many years he was a steward at the Brands Hatch racing circuit. The exhilaration of speed must have been the inspiration for Laurie's decision to take flying lessons when he retired. The family recall him "roaring over St James' Park" coming close to a victory roll.

Laurie's appreciation of landscape, castles and churches was wonderfully expressed in his photographs. His absorption in his cameras and his natural diffidence mean that there are few photographs of him. However, his family will always be able to conjure their own images of him perhaps with his headphones clamped to his ears or as ever, in his trademark flat cap.

Laurie, the family man full of friendship and faith is remembered with gratitude by us all.

PAST HISTORY

Christ Church was built at the end of the 18th Century by the socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship by the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church of that time to provide seating free of charge. Early supporters included the Archbishops of Canterbury and York; the great evangelical campaigner against slavery, William Wilberforce; Philip Pusey, the father of E B Pusey; and Martin Stafford Smith, the godfather of John Keble, who were both founders of the Oxford Movement. The building was designed by the famous Bath architect John Palmer, who was responsible for the completion of the Great Pump Room, Lansdown Crescent and St Swithin's, the parish church of Walcot. In November 1998, the congregation, friends and well-wishers from all over the world celebrated the bicentenary.

MINISTRY

Christ Church is unusual in not being a parish church. Much of the vitality of its life and worship derives from the fact that the congregation comes from all areas of the city and the surrounding districts. Whilst there is no full-time paid vicar, there is a non-stipendiary priest-in-charge, who leads a ministerial team of ordained and lay people. Worship at Christ Church largely reflects the traditions of those responsible for its foundation and the rich diversity of the Church of England as a whole. Thus, preaching and Bible-based teaching is firmly set within a liturgical setting which is best described as liberal and catholic.

SERVICES

The 8am Holy Communion is either Book of Common Prayer (1662) or Common Worship. At 10am the Eucharist is celebrated according to Common Worship. On the first Sunday of each month, there is a full Choral Evensong. A Junior Church and a Crêche cater for the children and young people who attend the 10am service. We hold special all-age services once a month and at festivals such as Easter, Christmas, Mothering Sunday and Harvest.

There are a variety of mid-week activities including Holy Communion at 11am every Wednesday during Lent, followed by lunch). The notice board and the weekly notice sheet provide details of discussion and prayer groups which are held at different times throughout the year. An all-age choir, which rehearses on Friday evenings maintains the much-admired music tradition at Christ Church.
