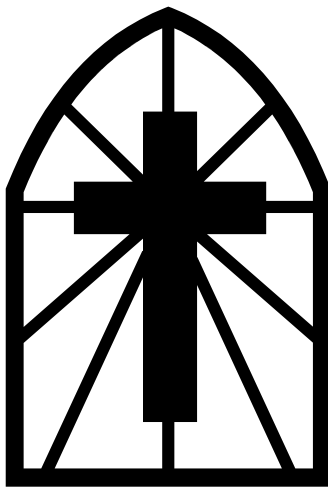

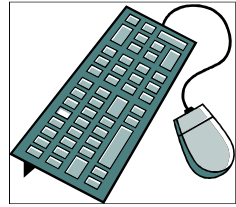

Salad Days

Summer days are the days for youth and beauty, with Wimbledon, extravagant hats and strawberries and cream. Shakespeare wrote of “our salad days” and that seems about right as the weather is set fair. I suppose Wimbledon springs to mind because this year a Scot has a chance of winning. And Scotland prompts thoughts of Robert Burns who took the view that the pleasures of summer are fleeting.

*But pleasures are like poppies spread:
You seize the flow'r; its bloom is shed;*

Burns had great facility for expressing universal truths in a seemingly homespun and simple way.

*O wad some Power the giftie gie us
To see oursels as ithers see us!*

In English, Burn's Scottish lines would read: “Oh would some power the gift give us, to see ourselves as others see us.” The poem concerns an incident in which the poet saw a woman in church sporting a new hat. Unknown to her, there was a louse visible on its plumes, subjecting her to much coarse merriment. Are we all like the lady with the louse in her hat, incapable of seeing our selves from outside? Are we all lost in the film in which we star in our mind's eye? Of course everyone has had such moments. I could tell many stories about making a fool of myself in public. So could most of us. Burns' poem strikes a universal note.

One man was given a unique opportunity to see himself as others saw him. One morning in 1888, Alfred Nobel was quite surprised to read his own obituary in a French newspaper. Obviously, it was a journalistic mistake. One of his brothers had died, and a careless reporter had used a prewritten obituary of the wrong man. But as he read, Nobel was shocked and deeply disturbed to learn what the world really thought of him. He was seen simply as the dynamite king, the merchant of death, who had amassed a great fortune out of explosives. Nobel had hoped his inventions would be useful to people and to nations. At that moment, he resolved to show the world the true purpose of his life. He revised his will so that his fortune would be dedicated to the recognition of great creative achievements with the highest award going to those who had done the most for world peace. Today, we all associate him with the Nobel Peace Prize.

Jesus constantly asked people to try and see themselves as God might

see them. This is a terrible and depressing thought except for the fact that through Christ, we have the chance to be renewed. St. Paul gets this point across by talking about clothing but when he talks about clothing he is not referring to shorts or summer dresses.. In Colossians he writes: "clothe yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator." Clothing symbolizes a new way of life through the putting "on the Lord Jesus" (Rom. 13:14). Paul insists: "We must clothe ourselves with Christ." (Gal. 3:27) "Put on the armour of light," he writes. "As God's chosen ones, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience..." And, above all, "clothe yourselves with love." (Col 3:12, 14). If we achieve all that, we're going to have a terrific summer.

All our yesterdays

Two years ago we delved into copies of the Christ Church magazine held in the church archives. The extracts we published were very popular and readers have asked for more. In this issue we go back to the summer of 1899 and find that once more the choir is going on an outing and the clergy enjoyed their holidays...

A concert had been held in May to raise money to enable the choir and the Christ Church Guild to spend the day at Clevedon. The journey was made by road in five horse drawn "brakes" which left Bennett Street early on the morning of 17th July. About ninety people "availed themselves of the opportunity."

"The Vicar [the Revd B Norton Thompson] accompanied the party and superintended the whole of the arrangements. Taking the Bristol Road [now the A4], the dusty condition of which was the only drawback, the large party excited the notice of villagers, many stopping to listen to snatches of song, given with varying effect, the wild exuberance of the lads of the choir, who occupied a brake all to themselves, often receiving kindly answer from the workmen and others. This was very noticeable in and near Bristol, many a man stopping work or journey to wish the boys a pleasant day. A halt was made at the Smythe Arms, Long Ashton, for refreshment of man and beast, some of the party taking the opportunity to obtain a clear view of the beautiful Manor House. Clevedon was reached at about midday, the Pier Hotel being the end of the journey, and here lunch was speedily served, grace being sung by the men of the choir."



In a short speech after lunch, the Vicar thanked Mrs Nash who provided a button-hole for everyone. The Guild members visited several churches as well as "Clevedon Court, the picturesque residence of Sir Edmund Elton". The choir boys, typically, made their way to the amusements on the pier.

"After tea an enthusiastic vote of thanks was passed to the Vicar for his kindness in making the arrangements and suitably acknowledged. The return journey was then commenced. At the halting place at Ashton the choir gave 'Down in a Flowery Vale', 'Simple Simon', 'The Three Crows', and Mr Worrall caused great amusement with one of his stump speeches. 'Victoria, our Queen' and other pieces testified to the loyalty of the vocalists, and were given and received with enthusiasm, along the route. Bath being reached, a very pleasant and enjoyable excursion came to an end."

In 1899, the magazine lists a clergy team of a Vicar and three curates. They all took a well-earned rest during the summer months. In his monthly letter the Revd B Norton Thompson records that:

The Revd E A Purvis has been Alpine climbing with a kindred spirit from a neighbouring church. The Revd F M Russell, who has just returned from Italy, takes up his abode at 10 Burlington Street. I and my family hope to go north towards the latter end of the month; whilst the Revd L O Asplen visits old friends in Weston-s-Mare in September."

Next month we stay in 1899 for the Sunday School Treat, Lady Tweedmouth's Scripture Examination, the London Children's Holiday Fund and the Flower Show in Christ Church Hall.

Circuit of Bath Walk

Homeless charity Julian House will be staging their 9th Circuit of Bath Walk on **Sunday 20 September**. The 20 mile circular route takes in some fantastic countryside on the edge of the city. Participants can do anywhere between 2 and 20 miles; thanks to the unique shuttle bus service that operates between start points on the day.



The route comprises public rights of way through Monkton Combe, Englishcombe, Newton St Loe, Upper Swainswick and Bathampton. Solsbury Hill, the Midford Valley and Woolley are just a few of the scenic highlights.

Not only is this a great day out but participants will also be giving a welcome boost to the charity's work. Although Julian House is best known for its busy Night Shelter, this is only one of services it provides for homeless men and women. Recognising that homelessness is not a single issue Julian House has developed new projects and facilities which aim to tackle the underlying problems which force men and women onto the streets.

Participants can start at any of the five check points, where detailed route instructions are supplied.

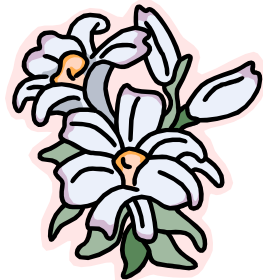

Deanery Synod Report

Our Deanery – strengths and challenges

The meeting discussed a number of strengths within the Deanery, and received a report from Richard Fothergill on The Filling Station.

The Filling Station started in Box in 2003 as a once a month meeting for “prayer and praise”. It was relaunched in 2006 to be more “outward looking”, so that visitors could be refreshed and “filled with God.” There was an influx of visitors, and they now had around a hundred at the Box meeting. There was then felt a need and desire to spread out, and The Filling Station opened in Bath itself in 2009, with one meeting every month on a Wednesday in Starbucks. Over 60 people now attend the Bath meeting. There are also plans to set up meetings in Priston, Hinton Charterhouse and Freshford and, after encouragement from the Bishop, to establish a Trust.

Their objects are:

- to be a blessing to the “wider church”; not a “house church”, or rival attraction;
- to be an accessible centre for spiritual refreshment of existing believers;
- to be a model of evangelism for new people;
- to build unity in the existing church.

Matthew Street presented a report on “Life Transfusion” at Peasedown St John following a church plant in the newer part of the town of people from Holy Trinity, Coombe Down. This project had challenged, strengthened and enriched both churches as they opened themselves up to hear God’s will for their future.

The need for parishes within the Deanery to come together, to share what they have and what they need was raised. Strengths and aspirations which churches within the Deanery include:

- ✚ *Community*
making the Church the natural focus
- ✚ *Development of people*
making the most of our people and their gifts
- ✚ *Mission*
already a great variety of programmes and initiatives

- ‡ *Fresh expressions*
taking the Word out of church, to the people
- ‡ *Young people*
already many extensive programmes

Churches were invited to discuss:

- successes, strengths or expertise in which their church is STRONG
- if they would be willing to be a FOCUS to help others (eg run a course, forum or meeting) in any of these areas?
- areas in which their church might PROFIT from the advice or practice of others.
- whether they would like something organised by the Deanery in these areas?

Synod will then discuss the churches' responses to these questions.

Local Charity Assists Families Going through Divorce

Bristol Family Mediation is a charity organisation with offices in Bristol, Bath and Weston-Super-Mare that exists to assist families who are experiencing the practical consequences of separation and divorce.

The charity, which is the oldest of its kind in the UK (this year celebrating its 30th anniversary), provides a service that helps couples whose relationships have broken down to come to an agreement upon arrangements constructively and amicably. This is done through the guidance of a trained mediator – an impartial professional who manages the discussions in a confidential, productive and future focussed manner.

Issues such as property, finance and child arrangements are addressed in a series of mediation sessions, with the aim of both parties agreeing decisions which are fair and workable for them and their children. As such, the service provides an alternative to taking disputes to court, which can result in an uneven resolution, be both financially and emotionally draining, and is often unnecessarily protracted.

PAST HISTORY

Christ Church was built at the end of the 18th Century by the socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship by the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church of that time to provide seating free of charge. Early supporters included the Archbishops of Canterbury and York; the great evangelical campaigner against slavery, William Wilberforce; Philip Pusey, the father of E B Pusey; and Martin Stafford Smith, the godfather of John Keble, who were both founders of the Oxford Movement. The building was designed by the famous Bath architect John Palmer, who was responsible for the completion of the Great Pump Room, Lansdown Crescent and St Swithin's, the parish church of Walcot. In November 1998, the congregation, friends and well-wishers from all over the world celebrated the bicentenary.

MINISTRY

Christ Church is unusual in not being a parish church. Much of the vitality of its life and worship derives from the fact that the congregation comes from all areas of the city and the surrounding districts. Whilst there is no full-time paid vicar, there is a non-stipendiary priest-in-charge, who leads a ministerial team of ordained and lay people. Worship at Christ Church largely reflects the traditions of those responsible for its foundation and the rich diversity of the Church of England as a whole. Thus, preaching and Bible-based teaching is firmly set within a liturgical setting which is best described as liberal and catholic.

SERVICES

The 8am Holy Communion is either Book of Common Prayer (1662) or Common Worship. At 10am the Eucharist is celebrated according to Common Worship. On the first Sunday of each month, there is a full Choral Evensong. A Junior Church and a Crèche cater for the children and young people who attend the 10am service. We hold special all-age services once a month and at festivals such as Easter, Christmas, Mothering Sunday and Harvest.

There are a variety of mid-week activities including Holy Communion at 11am every Wednesday during Lent, followed by lunch). The notice board and the weekly notice sheet provide details of discussion and prayer groups which are held at different times throughout the year. An all-age choir, which rehearses on Friday evenings maintains the much-admired music tradition at Christ Church.
