From the priest-in-charge...

Revd Lore Chumbley writes:

On Sunday 11 February, after eight very happy years journeying with you all, Colin and I will join you for our final service in Christ Church. Thank you for the outpouring of love and support for both of us over the past few months. Thank you for everything you have taught us about how to be an inclusive church defending liberal values with passion and integrity.

As some of you explained when we arrived, Julian Road, on which Christ Church is built, follows the route of the old Roman road which the Romans called Road 14. I like to imagine the Romans overseeing the building of the road some time after 43 AD. Had the labourers heard the rumours from Jerusalem – rumours of the Jewish believers who taught that Jesus Christ, a Galilean rabbi, was the Son of God and in proof of that had been raised from the dead?

Rumours of God continued to swirl along Julian Road. In the 18th century Charles Daubeney's conviction that a church should be built in which the poor could worship without paying pew rents came to fruition. He encouraged the rich and powerful to donate funds, and preached a sermon which raised several thousand pounds so Christ Church could be built on Julian Road. The church stood as a solid witness to the welcome Jesus extends to the poor, the disadvantaged and the overlooked. Two hundred and twenty five years after its consecration, Christ Church has

stayed true to its founding convictions. Right up to the present we have aimed to offer a warm welcome to everyone who comes through our doors. We are proud that the Rainbow Steel Band still see Christ Church as "their" church, and that the local community come to our weekly community café. I truly believe that Christ Church's unique history, its music and you the worshippers make it the best church in the Church of England.

Colin and I will no longer be walking with you but you have our love, our gratitude for what we have shared, and our prayers for you all as you travel the next part of the Christ Church journey.



At the heart of the Candlemas liturgy is the Nunc Dimittis, touchingly repeating the words of Simeon: "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word."

Decisions have yet to be made about who might sit on any selection panel for the next Priest-in-Charge. Members of the group are not precluded from being invited by Trustees to sit on such a panel.

Parking at Christ Church – an important update

Last month's notice about parking left out an important detail: parking space 10, the one nearest the steps up to the Museum of Bath at Work, is rented out to the tenant of Cottage No. 2 and is **not available** for parking at any time, *including Sundays*. Below is an updated summary. Apologies for the omission.

When you come to church **on Sunday**, feel free to park in any available space **except**

- (1) the space on the ramp to the left of the Lower Mews,
- (2) space 10, the space nearest the steps up to the Museum of Bath at Work, and
- (3) the spaces to the right of the Lower Mews kitchen and behind it.

If you think your car might be in the way of others, particularly (1) above, then please leave your details on your dashboard so that you can be contacted in an emergency.

Monday to Saturday, Christ Church rents out most of the car parking spaces, and the only spaces *available* for church use are:

- (1) the two marked spaces behind the church, adjacent to the Lower Mews kitchen, and
- (2) three spaces in front of the main church doors, *excluding* the space nearest Julian Road. Bear in mind that the top space (marked with a disabled symbol) is for those who need level access to the building – please respect this at all times.

From Monday to Saturday, if you have been given a Christ Church parking permit, please remember to display it to verify that you are parking with permission.

There will be a celebration of Holy Communion with the Imposition of Ashes at 7:30pm on Ash Wednesday, 14 February. There is a tradition that the ashes are made from the previous year's Palm Crosses. If you would like to contribute your Palm Cross please bring it to church on Sunday 4 or 11 February.

Lent theme 2024: “Watch and Pray”

The Church of England’s Lent theme for 2024 is *Watch and Pray: Wisdom and hope for Lent and life*. On the night he was betrayed, Jesus knelt in darkness in the Garden of Gethsemane. Though he pleaded with his disciples “Stay here with me... Watch and pray;” they all fell asleep, leaving him alone in his hour of deepest suffering.

This Lent we are encouraged to wait expectantly for God

to meet us and sustain us through the storms and trials we all face. This year’s resources have been inspired and informed by



the Archbishop of Canterbury’s 2024 Lent book, *Tarry Awhile: Wisdom from Black Spirituality for people of faith* by Selina Stone (SPCK).

Watch and Pray invites us to seek God in both familiar and unfamiliar places this Lent: in darkness and in quiet; in movement and migration; in the healing and transforming work of the Spirit; in the weeping of Holy Week and in the joy of Easter morning.

The e-mails will offer Bible readings, short reflections and a practical challenge, as well as prayers linked to weekly themes. A free Watch and Pray app for both iOS and Android will be released in early February.

News from Spafford Children’s Center

Christ Church is a supporter of the Spafford Children’s Center in East Jerusalem, which aids children and families. Djemila Cope writes: In a recent update from the Center’s CEO, Shahd Souri, she talks about conditions in East Jerusalem being very tense with occasional clashes affecting movement within the Old City. Security measures remain stringent, impacting travel, especially between East Jerusalem and the West Bank. Checkpoints between these areas are intermittently closed, making it challenging some days for our West Bank staff to reach Jerusalem.

The Spafford Children’s Center has managed to keep staff and patients safe by adapting schedules and using alternative routes

whenever possible. Shopping on the streets is affected due to the heavily armed Israeli Military patrols in East Jerusalem as they search people and demand identity cards with many questions related to why the individual Palestinian needs to be in the area.

Most shops are closed due to this security situation. Anxiety and genuine fear amongst families and the population in general have led to a huge demand for the new Youth Leadership Programme/Trauma Course that the Center is running for teenagers together with Trauma Therapy for children and mothers.

Sustaining the vital education and health-care programmes at the Spafford Center is very important. These programmes directly impact the lives of East Jerusalem children by increasing their confidence and giving them the tools to survive in a hostile area with an uncertain future.

Thanks to all at Christ Church who have supported this work. It is much appreciated.



Bishop's Message for February

Caring for Creation

As Christians, while we may look to reduce our own carbon footprint, we are called to be stewards and witnesses of a much more radical resource. The clue is in the word “ecology”.

“Eco” comes from the Greek word *oikos*, meaning house or dwelling place. Ecology is partly about our responsibility to recognise the precious gift of the Earth, as our dwelling place – to be thankful, and play our part. God made humankind to care for the earthly world; Jesus amplifies the call, as He uses “nature” as the sign of how we can live in order to flourish and to fulfil God’s will.

“Logy” comes from the Greek word *logos*, interpreted as reason, the ordering of knowledge, logic. In John’s Gospel, Logos is a word to describe Jesus – through whom all things are made and from whom all true knowledge comes. Logos is the Word, the source of all goodness and grace, for every human life, and for all of creation.

It is the Logos, the Word, who inhabits our lives, our creation – inviting us to recognise His light and allow it

to overcome the darkness of our own limited concerns and agendas. We meet the Logos in scripture, in worship, in prayer, and in deeper reflection.

In Jesus, as Logos, we can find the wisdom, the resources and the commitment to play our part in caring for creation. We are able to invite others to recognise the deeper truths about Eco, our common dwelling place, and to see more clearly how we join with others to work out what to do, how to live, and honour the gift of life that we receive through Him. The Logos is the possibility of good news for humankind and for the Earth.

What a responsibility each Christian disciple is called to bear! And what grace can be ours to enable us to fulfil our calling, and help all of God’s children become caught up in the praise and prayer that gives true life to our dwelling place, and to exercise our stewardship appropriately.

Read John 1:1-14. Become an ECO-warrior – committed to our common dwelling place – through celebrating the power and presence of the LOGOS.

ECOLOGY: we know it makes sense.

They offer end-of-life care and bereavement support, as well as vital respite sessions and emotional support to the children's families.

About Christ Church

*We're a liberal, inclusive and open church,
seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty
in our faith and doubt, and support in our community*

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included John Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, and William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery. We must recognise, however, that much of Bath's wealth at the time derived, directly or indirectly, from the trafficking and exploitation of enslaved human beings, so that inevitably some of the funds donated ultimately derived from this source.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England

parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
