Crafts from the Holy Land for Christmas

As part of the Bath Christmas Market, a Christmas stall from Bethlehem is running until Sunday 15 December at BRLSI (Bath Royal Literary and Scientific Institute), 16-18 Queen Square, Bath BAI 2HN.

The Holy Land Cooperative had a chalet in the Christmas Market many times until Covid. People came every year to look for it and add to their collection of Nativity figures, replace a lost baby Jesus, or add an extra angel or a camel and donkey. Now they can find all their much-loved figures again and plenty of traditional Palestinian embroideries, motherof-pearl religious items, decorative ceramics and jewellery as well.

The Holy Land Handicraft Co-operative Society promotes the work of small-scale craftsmen and women from Bethlehem and surrounding villages, who are finding it very hard to bring their goods to market in the midst of the current Middle East conflict. when tourists are no longer visiting.

Come and discover the magic of olive wood carvings and other unique gifts from Bethlehem, while also supporting craftspeople when times are hard.

Thoughts on the Makin report

Virginia Knight writes:

Safeguarding may be, and in some respects has to be, a largely unseen ministry and activity of Christ Church, but recent events in the Church of England have shown just how important it is. I was an early signer of the petition urging the Archbishop of Canterbury to resign, because I felt he had lost credibility in the secular world which still looks to the Church to uphold moral standards, to say nothing of the confidence of large parts of the Church of England itself.

The failings which led to his resignation (and at the time of writing may lead to others) appear to have been in the upper levels of the hierarchy rather than at the grass roots, where safeguarding procedures and standards have also improved overwhelmingly in recent decades. There still remain weak areas, such as varying levels of provision and support across dioceses, as documented by the lay Report earlier this year. I believe that here in Bath and Wells we have one of the better diocesan safeguarding teams, both in numbers and in their experience.

The duties of safeguarding officers have also changed greatly even within the last few years (and are likely to continue to do so in the near future), and now include training congregations to identify people coming into our church who may be experiencing abuse elsewhere. Worthy though this is in itself, I wonder whether it may be in part an attempt to deflect attention from the possibility of abuse occurring within the Church. Certainly there has been a culture of covering up and protecting reputations and networks.

Churches around Bath are adapting to the increased safeguarding workload, and I have been making a survey of how they are doing this. I hope to present my findings to our new incumbent when she arrives, with a view to reforming how we distribute this workload in Christ Church.

Bishop Ruth will leave Coventry at Christmas and, after a break, return to her role as Bishop of Taunton around the end of January.

"Jesus, the Light of the World"



From the Rt Revd Michael Beasley. Bishop of Bath and Wells

"All is calm, all is bright" may not be the words that many of us would use to describe our experience of either the run-up to Christmas or the feast itself. Presents to buy and wrap, food to order and cook, events and church services to be part of. And that's before we've negotiated the big day itself. I saw one website recently that claimed Christmas is considered as one of the six most stressful life events, along with divorce, moving house and changing jobs!

In the midst of such chaos, our churches offer an opportunity to find peace during this busy time - stillness, quiet and the opportunity to stand back from all the pressures that the season contains. About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included John Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, and William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery. We must recognise, however, that much of Bath's wealth at the time derived, directly or indirectly, from the trafficking and exploitation of enslaved human beings, so that inevitably some of the funds donated ultimately derived from this source.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England



parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
