The symbol for the Season of Creation 2024 is the first-fruits of hope. We have hope that the Creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the freedom and glory of the children of God (Romans 8:21).

If there was a special event coming up, she would always ask if we would like her to bring something, meaning could she cook something as her contribution. She was always eager to put on her apron and help.

Del was also part of the flower team, an important role in contributing to the beauty of our church, which she so enjoyed.

Del was appreciative of everyone's talents and gifts, young and old, with an interested ear and an encouraging compliment. Many

Trauma for them is an ongoing condition.

# Bishop's Message for September

#### Reimagining generosity



From the Rt Revd Michael Beasley, Bishop of Bath and Wells

In John's Gospel, the first of the signs that Jesus offers to show who He is happens at a wedding in the town of Cana in Galilee (John 2:1-11). Jesus saves the whole event from being a social disaster. The presenting issue is that the wine runs out. This exposes the families that have organised the event to the possibility of severe embarrassment. Rather than modelling lavish hospitality, they are in danger of showing themselves to be stingy and disorganised. Thankfully, Jesus's mum is alerted to the situation and gets Jesus on the case. He comes up with a solution and all is well.

What gets me every time about this story is the scale and the quality of the solution that Jesus presents. If my calculations are right, Jesus saves the day by creating the equivalent of six wheelie bins full of wine. And not just your supermarket bottom shelf stuff. The wine He provides is of the very best quality - stuff that would delight sommeliers and wine snobs the world over.

In His first action, Jesus could have chosen to show any number of things about Himself - His wisdom, His power, His goodness or so on. What's striking is that He begins by revealing that He is someone of astonishing and abundant generosity. This is at heart who Jesus is.

If this is who Jesus is, then that means that this is who God is too. For "in God there is no unChristlikeness". In His first action, Jesus is showing us that at heart, God is abundantly and astonishingly generous.

If we're all made in God's image. might that be at heart who we're called to be too? Often, the call to be generous can be portrayed as hard and difficult, about self-sacrifice and denial, of the costly call to put others first. But what if we reimagined what being generous means? If we understood being generous as in fact the way to reveal and enjoy our true selves - lavishly, abundantly, joyfully... merrily?

A wheelie bin of wine, anyone?

## This month's charity: Lux Youth Project

The loose collection on the second and fourth Sundays of this month and next – 8 and 22 September, and then 13 and 27 October - will go to the Lux Youth Project. (Donations in collection envelopes will continue to go to Christ Church.)

Lux Youth Project is the Bath offshoot of Youth for Christ, and like Youth for Christ it delivers community youth work, mentoring and small group work in schools and chaplaincy. It runs open access drop-in clubs, a dance academy, breakfast club, one-to-one mentoring and enrichment courses in Bath particularly in areas of deprivation. Currently much of its work takes place in the Southdown area of Bath but as it grows it may expand into other areas of need.

From the charity's website: "Lux Youth Project is a Christian charity inspired by our faith to work with young people across Bath



& North East Somerset. meeting their physical, emotional and spiritual needs. We were formerly known as Bath Youth for Christ and

have worked in Bath and the surrounding area for more than 30 years, providing open access and schools youth work. In 2023 we became Lux Youth Project.

"LUX is Latin for light and we want to be light for young people experiencing times of darkness and difficulty. We also believe that every person has light in them and that with the right support and encouragement can share that light to make their lives and communities brighter. As it says in the Bible: 'Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven' (Matthew 5:16)."

### About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included John Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, and William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery. We must recognise, however, that much of Bath's wealth at the time derived, directly or indirectly, from the trafficking and exploitation of enslaved human beings, so that inevitably some of the funds donated ultimately derived from this source.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England



parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
