

Bath Half Marathon

Watch out when travelling to church on Sunday 17 March - this year's Bath Half Marathon takes place on that day. Roads along the route (shown in red on the map) and access to city car parks are closed from 9am to 4pm (and Royal Victoria Park from 6am to 6:30pm) and parking on those roads - including disabled parking - is suspended from 6am to 4pm. Once again this year the start and finish are on Royal Avenue (in front of the Royal Crescent) and additional parking restrictions apply on a number of roads including Lansdown Road (shown in green). Traffic is likely to be heavier than usual on the diversion routes (shown in purple), which include Julian Road, so you might wish to allow extra time to get to and from Christ Church. Temporary crossings (marked TC on the map) are provided for pedestrians to cross the race route at Green Park and Brougham Hayes.

Sharing the Easter story

From the Diocese of Bath and Wells:

Preparations are well underway for some creative Easter celebrations across Bath and Wells during Holy Week - in our churches, in our schools, as well as in our homes and outdoor spaces.

Suzi Darwin, Children and Youth Worker at St Swithin's, Bath, is one of the organisers of an event designed to share the good news by recreating the wonder of the Easter story in Victoria Park, below the Royal Crescent.

Between 2pm and 4pm on Good Friday, Suzi and other volunteers from six Bath churches will be holding the Easter Adventure in the Park. At stations dotted around the park they will be telling stories and engaging children in a range of ways, from waving palms to mark Jesus's journey into Jerusalem to sharing squash and biscuits at a Last Supper.

"Last year's event was really lovely," she explains, "with people from different churches getting involved and acting out the Easter story at churches around the city. Around 100 people joined in with the event last year, some who regularly attend church and some who don't, including some families who attend our church toddler group.

"This year's event is going to be very interactive. The children can get fully involved and at the end we hope to be able to give them an Easter egg and a Bible. By holding it in Victoria Park we hope that even more people can join us - and can meet and come to know Jesus."

knelt in darkness in the Garden of



Gethsemane. Though he pleaded with his disciples "Stay here with me...Watch and pray," they all fell asleep, leav-

ing him alone in his hour of deepest suffering. This Lent we are encouraged to wait expectantly for God to meet us and sustain us through the storms and trials we all face. Watch and Pray invites us to seek God in both familiar and unfamiliar places this Lent: in darkness and in quiet; in movement and migration; in the healing and transforming work of the Spirit; in the weeping of Holy Week and in the joy of Easter morning.

Bishop's Message for March

New life for all the world



From the Rt Revd Michael Beasley, Bishop of Bath and Wells

Sowing seeds, chitting potatoes, choosing varieties. Easter acts as starter's orders for the gardening year. Beds are cultivated, lawns are mown, plans for all the growth and new life that spring and summer will bring are made and then turned into action.

There's a much greater connection between gardening and Easter than it merely being the time to dust off forks and spades. For in the Bible, a garden is the setting for Easter itself. In John's Gospel (John 20:1-18) Mary Magdalene meets the risen Jesus in a garden. Indeed, Jesus's appearance to Mary is so unexpected that at first she can't believe it's really him. So she mistakes the man she meets, "supposing him to be the gardener" (John 20:15).

In John's account, all the new life contained in the first Easter chimes with a much earlier story set in a garden too. This is of the new life of another man and woman, the creation story of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden and contained in the book of Genesis (Genesis 2:4 - 3:24). In that

story, Adam is the gardener (Genesis 2:15), only for things to go wrong. In John, Jesus is portrayed as the new Adam - come to bring new life that has no end.

What would happen if we were to think of our churches as gardens, primed to welcome the spring that is the new life of Jesus this Easter? What would happen if we imagined ourselves called to be gardeners – like our father Adam and the new Adam, Jesus? What would we expect to grow? What might need pruning or weeding? What new plans for the coming season would we make and turn into action? What would be the harvest that we'd sow for, tend and then reap?

For I reckon we should see Easter as the starting point of all that God wants to do among us and with us. Jesus's Resurrection opens us to being part of God's new creation. Easter offers us a fresh start for life, relationships and the life of our churches: new life for all the world.

Happy gardening and a very Happy Easter to you all!

About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included John Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, and William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery. We must recognise, however, that much of Bath's wealth at the time derived, directly or indirectly, from the trafficking and exploitation of enslaved human beings, so that inevitably some of the funds donated ultimately derived from this source.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England



parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
