

The Sun, the Moon and Easter

Why the date of Easter varies, and why this isn't a bad thing

First, a peaceful, joy-filled and blessed Easter to you all. With the state of our world today we can never take that blessing for granted, can we?

People have commented over the last few weeks how quickly Easter has come this year. It has been interesting to revisit why this is. The convoluted system for working out when Easter will fall is the result of a mix of Hebrew, Roman and Egyptian calendars, culture and custom. The Egyptians based their calendar on the Sun, which was adopted by Roman and then Christian culture, while Judaism bases its calendar partly on the Moon, and Islam also uses the phases of the Moon. Easter's date fluctuates not least thanks to attempts

to harmonise those solar and lunar calendars, with the issue further complicated by the fact that different strands of Christianity use different formulae for their calculations.

In 1582 the Gregorian calendar, which was adopted and promoted by Pope Gregory XIII, was largely designed to make the date of Easter earlier and easier to calculate. That is the calendar we still use today. Eastern Churches (Greek and Slavic) and Oriental Churches (Syrian, Armenian, Coptic Egyptian and Ethiopian) continued using the Julian Calendar, named after Julius Caesar, even after Europe adopted the Gregorian Calendar in 1582. This is why even now Easter is calculated

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by differently by the Eastern and Oriental Orthodox Churches to the Catholic and other western churches. Fun Fact: Easter last fell on the same day for both Christian Church strands in 2017, but this will not happen again until 2034.

Many Christians feel that retaining the moveable date of Easter and an understanding of its cosmic aspects are important. Fixing the festival to a particular day would be to ignore the rhythm and meaning of the planetary spheres and their subtle influence on life on the earth. And perhaps then this would reduce it to simply a remembrance of an event that occurred instead of celebrating it as the pivotal point and the most joyful fact that makes a personal relationship with God for each one of us possible!

Paul tells the Thessalonians to "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). These verses could not have been further from my mind as I spent a whole day last week catching up on washing, shopping and housework - time I grew increasingly resentful of, with a backlog of study needing to be attended to! It's not that I mind doing the chores (there are few things that make my heart sing more than a line full of billowing washing), it's just the time it takes when other things are pressing.

What I needed was some perspective. I got that, that evening watching the news women in Sudan forced from their homes; they and their families living in horrendous conditions, facing violence, sickness and impending famine. Of course, Sudan is just one example of this needless suffering in our desperately troubled world.

And then I thought about what I have - a spacious, safe home, cupboards full of food, healthy, educated children - and on top of this I get to study. Looked at from this perspective, my life is one privilege piled on another.

But what does God call me to do for those women living in such desperate conditions? To return to Paul's verse: "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances." He is tasking me with being thankful and rejoicing in what I have, appreciating everything

- but also, see sandwiched in the middle? To "pray continually". My thankfulness reminds me I must pray continually for those whose unbearable lives I witness daily - and asking God: what can I do?

And perhaps next time if, like me, you are despairing at those monotonous chores, rejoice and be thankful - your own home, plentiful food and clean clothes every day. We are blessed indeed.

"We wanted to offer a way to access worship for those who aren't drawn to worship in a church building," they said, "and we've already got a core group of families who come every month. Even when it poured with rain the other Sunday and we thought no one would turn up, they did, which is a very encouraging sign for the future."

A shared life of prayer and mission

From the Diocese of Bath and Wells:

Revd Liz Dudley, with Pioneers Elizabeth and Andrew Alden, share plans for a new Christian Community in Frome.

Work is underway at the former vicarage at St Mary's to prepare the house for a new Christian community of four self-supporting adults. They will live there for a year and work locally.

Mary's House will offer a lifestyle grounded in contemplative prayer and a Christian commitment to the environment. The shared life will be marked by a daily pattern of prayer, weekly work in the local community, and a rule of life with shared values and approaches to missional living.

Why Frome? The combination of St Mary's site, the congregation's missional outlook, and the pioneering work at The Giant's Garden presents a compelling opportunity. Frome is open to the spiritual side of life, there is a

common concern for those on the edge of society, and we hope that those who choose to live here will be able to connect with that aspect of life here. Mary's House offers an opportunity to show that you can live out in the world and live in a Christian community with a rhythm of prayer and rule of life; that it is possible to do the two together.

The hope is that this community will contribute to God's work of regeneration in the churches and the town, increasing the missional impact of God's people. Long term it could develop a model that could be replicated elsewhere in the diocese.

The community will include a dispersed element of people living in their own homes but following a similar rule of life. Bishop's Message for April

Worship is key



From the Rt Revd Michael Langrish, Assistant Bishop for Bath and Wells

In January I was back in my old Diocese of Exeter, marking the death of Sabine Baring Gould 100 years before. What an extraordinary person he was, with an incredible range and roundedness of learning and interests, in an equally full and fulfilled life. He was a great traveller and prolific writer of biographies, folklore, travel books, theology, novels and hymns, including some, such as "Onward Christian soldiers", that remain popular today. He was a linguist and translator; and, as an archaeologist on Dartmoor, very much a pioneer in the field. For many, his greatest achievement was collecting the old folk songs of Devon and Cornwall, providing inspiration for such composers as Elgar, Vaughan Williams and Holst. He was also Squire of Lewtrenchard and, being ordained, appointed himself as parish priest as well!

This he saw as his true vocation. His responsibility, and that of the local church, was the cure of souls from cradle to grave. This meant a care for the spiritual well-being of all in the

community and for their bodily and social welfare too. Striving for good health and housing must go hand in hand with growth in faith and prayer. All should be encouraged to full humanity, to holy discipleship, to the recognition, and use, of whatever gifts anyone possessed for the common good.

But, underlying all of this, one other aspect of this great man's life speaks very strongly to me now. That is how he understood worship and its relationship to the whole of life. "To worship is to quicken the conscience by the holiness of God, to feed the mind with the truth of God, to purge the imagination by the beauty of God, to open the heart to the love of God, to devote the will to the purpose of God."

This month brings us encouraging stories of new Christian worshipping communities in Bath and Wells [see page 4]. Worshipping is key. I am reminded of the later words of Archbishop William Temple: "It is sometimes said that conduct is supremely important, and worship helps it. The truth is that worship is supremely important, and conduct tests it."

Wells Cathedral admission charge

Wells Cathedral has announced changes to its admission guidelines taking effect this month. Anglican cathedrals receive limited funding from the Church or the government, and Wells says it needs to raise £4,500 every day



to maintain and care for the building. From Monday 22 April it will ask adult tourism visitors to contribute a £14 admission charge. This includes a ground floor tour or audio tour, access to the new Undercroft Exhibition, and re-entry at no further charge for 12 months. Entry for under-18s will be free.

However, there will never be a charge for people who wish to come into the Cathedral to pray, attend a service or light a candle; everyone is welcome. Free passes will also be available to local residents and to anyone on the Electoral Roll of an Anglican church anywhere in the Diocese of Bath and Wells. The funds raised by the new tourist admission charge will go towards the care of the cathedral building and its mission.

This month's charity: Jamie's Farm

The loose collection on the second and fourth Sundays of this month - 14 and 28 April - will go to Jamie's Farm, a charity chosen by our young people. (Donations in collection envelopes will continue to go to Christ Church.)

As you'll remember from last month, the children's choice for Charity of the Month in March and April is Jamie's Farm. This charity offers opportunities for young people to take part in a unique residential programme, built around working on the farm. The young people who benefit are from all sorts of backgrounds, with differing needs, including social and emotional-related, and often having difficulties in school. The programme is designed specifically to improve well-being, boost engagement, improve behaviour and develop



essential life-skills such as communication and self-awareness. There are six farms all over the country, and one is located just outside Bath, in Box. You can find out more about the charity at https://jamiesfarm.org.uk.

About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included John Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, and William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery. We must recognise, however, that much of Bath's wealth at the time derived, directly or indirectly, from the trafficking and exploitation of enslaved human beings, so that inevitably some of the funds donated ultimately derived from this source.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England



parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
