

30 years of women priests

Bath and Wells celebrates 30 years of women's ordination

A special Choral Evensong was held at Wells Cathedral on Tuesday 14 May to mark the 30th anniversary of the ordination of women to the priesthood in the Church of England.

In 1994, 18 months after General Synod gave its final approval for the ordination of women, 30 women were ordained at Wells Cathedral by the then Bishop of Bath and Wells, Rt Revd Jim Thompson, and the Bishop of Taunton, Rt Revd Richard Lewis (see page 2).

The service welcomed many of those who were among the first to be ordained in Bath and Wells 30 years ago.

"We celebrate the full variety of ministries and the fact that the episcopate is

now open to women," Revd Chantal Mason, Dean of Women's Ministry in Bath and Wells, said after the service. "But there are still residue issues which limit women in their flourishing as priests. So as women priests at this time, it is our responsibility to be diligent in leadership, to serve faithfully, and to ensure that the women who come after us are not hampered in their God-given ministries. For all that has been, thank you! For all that is to come, Yes!"

Preaching at the service, Revd Prebendary Ronnie Crossman spoke of her own journey to ordination and also

Open Eucharist for LGBTO+ Christians

There will be an Open Eucharist (said) for LGBTQ+ Christians at Christ Church on Saturday 29 June at 3pm, the Feast day of St Peter and St Paul. All are invited. Simon Tatton-Brown will preside.

Simon regularly attended a similar monthly communion service when he was serving in the Diocese of Manchester and occasionally hosted one in his own church. We hope this may be the first of many, an expression of how Christ Church is truly an inclusive and welcoming congregation. For there are many churches of all denominations, including here in Bath, where LGBTQ+ people do not feel so welcome. So please pass this invitation on to anyone you know who might like to come, and make it more widely known.

Counting wildlife

Communities are invited to celebrate the wildlife in churchyards and cemeteries during the week Saturday 8 June to Sunday 16 June. Love Your Burial Ground Week is designed for those who look after burial grounds, while "Churches Count on Nature", which runs concurrently, is an opportunity to perform a "nature count" and record the biodiversity in churchyards. It is a joint initiative promoted by the conservation charity Caring for God's Acre, the Church of England, the Church in Wales and environmental group A Rocha UK.

Participants are asked to record the species they encounter and add them to a public database accessible to all, using a smartphone app called iNaturalist or more traditional methods. In the last three years, 1,300 counts took place in churches in England and Wales, and over 47,500 wildlife records were submitted to Caring for God's Acre. The data will be used to determine where different species are located in the country. This can aid churches of all denominations in increasing biodiversity on their land for the enrichment of the environment and local communities.

Diocesan Message for June

The gift of prayer



From the Revd Canon Toby Wright, who will be installed as Dean of Wells on Saturday 16 June

It is a great joy and privilege to come and join you here in Bath and Wells as the new Dean of Wells, to serve the Cathedral, the diocese and the county. This is an area with strong links on my maternal side, with my grandparents being married in Bath, and many relatives from around this patch.

One of the many things which drew me to this role is the privilege of prayer in your beautiful Cathedral Church. Each morning we gather and pray for the life of the diocese, and give thanks for that same life in the evening. Please be assured of my prayers for you in your mission and ministry, and I warmly look forward to getting out to explore the diocese.

As I reflect on this time of change, I am mindful of the importance of finding patterns of prayer to sustain our lives and nourish our spiritual growth. As Archbishop Desmond Tutu said many years ago, we must "think of prayer as a relationship." We are to invest in it and to find space so that it can develop,

and this takes time. Or as the mystic Evelyn Underhill put it, "On every level of life, from housework to heights of prayer, in all judgement and efforts to get things done, hurry and impatience are sure marks of the amateur."

We all know the importance of taking time to invest in relationships, and I love the challenge that hurry and impatience are sure marks of the amateur. As we reflect on our own prayer lives, I wonder if there are ways that we can deepen our relationship in prayer? The Christian tradition is packed with ways to help people learn to pray. Maybe we can find ways to slow ourselves down and be more present to the gift of prayer, so that we may join in the Apostle Paul's prayer, "we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding" (Colossians 1:9).

Prayer for young people

Each day focuses on a different topic affecting children and young people, with a Bible passage and points to ponder for each. The themes for the seven days are: Community, Wellbeing, Courage, Leaders, The World, Concerns, and Growth. There are also creative prayer ideas to use at home, in small groups and in church services.

June's charity: Combe Down Holiday Trust

The loose collection on the second and fourth Sundays of this month -9 and 23 June - will go to the Combe Down Holiday Trust. (Donations in collection envelopes will continue to go to Christ Church.)

Combe Down Holiday Trust is a local charity providing holidays, short breaks or days out for disabled people and/or their carers and families living in the Bath and North East Somerset area.

The Trust's aim is to support disabled people, both those with permanent disabilities and those disabled through illnesses such as cancer, enabling them, their families and/or carers to have a short break, holiday or respite care, or to simply have a day out.

The overwhelming majority of clients are on low incomes or state benefits, or are pensioners with small occupational pensions that preclude them from benefits. This leaves them very disadvantaged financially. The Trust also has a number of clients who have mental health problems and are also on very limited incomes - often barely enough to live on.

For families and particularly carers, exhausted by the demands on them, the need for a break is often great. For carers it is a chance to recharge their batteries, which can be vital in ensuring their ability to carry on with their caring role.

About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included John Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, and William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery. We must recognise, however, that much of Bath's wealth at the time derived, directly or indirectly, from the trafficking and exploitation of enslaved human beings, so that inevitably some of the funds donated ultimately derived from this source.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England



parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
