Happy New Year

By the time you read this, the New Year will be well worn. To be honest, 1st January dawned with news bulletins so horribly familiar that one wondered why on earth we celebrated at midnight at all. The frenzy of the New Year sales in the high streets were



bargains for some and redundancy for many. Official figures show that 1.8 million people are currently unemployed in Britain but experts fear the number of jobless could hit 3 million next year as the banking crisis and falling consumer spending drives more firms to the wall.

Most of us have difficulty in understanding the complexities of economic trends and changes. Indeed, even economists fail to agree on either the causes of the current mess or the way to get out of it. It is easy to shrug off theories and arguments until account is taken of the human misery behind the headlines.

Well before Christmas, a survey of 155 local authorities in England provided an alarming measure of the effects of the economic crisis on family life. It revealed a sharp rise in demand for advisory services. In total, 93 per cent of councils said they had seen an increase in demand for debt counselling while 69 per cent had seen more residents seeking housing advice. Half had seen more people asking for employment advice as the number of jobless reaches 2 million. It was also found that 17 per cent have experienced an increase in demand for relationship counselling.

This poll seems to have confirmed earlier predictions that recession would lead to thousands more married couples splitting up. One sociologist put a figure on it, claiming that a 10 per cent drop in property prices would trigger a 5 per cent increase in the divorce rate.

There seems little doubt that the economic recession will touch almost everyone in the UK in some shape or form. Typically, the trauma of redundancy brings a sense of being useless and unwanted. There is a vital role for the church in supporting those in despair and standing alongside the dispossessed.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has said: "What would our life be like if we really believed that our wealth, our treasure, was our fellow-human beings? Religious faith points to a God who takes most seriously and values most extravagantly the people who often look least productive or successful—as if none of us could really be said to be doing well unless

these people were secure."

A prayer has been written to offer comfort to those who have been sacked as the economy heads into recession, by recognising their fears and suggesting that belief in God can help them cope. It includes the verse: "Hear me as I cry out in confusion, help me to think clearly, and calm my soul."

Bishops join call for the UK to block EU privileges for Israel

Three Anglican bishops have joined over 200 public figures in a call for the UK government to act against the European Union extending further privileges to Israel while it remains in breach of international law. The current Gaza conflict is particularly cited.

The petition was published in the Guardian newspaper on 5 January. The Church of England bishops signing are from the dioceses of Bath and Wells, Exeter and Winchester.

Listening and learning Some thoughts on Christian Unity

Two fresh expressions (small "f", small "e") which recently came my way are face-mail and receptive ecumenism. Their meanings are somewhat similar. Face-mail seems to mean popping into the next door office and talking to a colleague rather than e-mailing him. It doesn't seem to mean Skype.



Receptive ecumenism implies not just dialogue with someone of a different denomination but attentive listening, with a willingness to learn.

The Director of the Anglican Centre in Rome concluded his talk in the Jerusalem Chamber recently on the warm, appreciative note that while we and the Catholics may have run into difficulties over, for example, the ordination of women, receptive ecumenism flourishes. There are many examples of this; at the Oxford Memorial service for the late Very Reverend Professor Henry Chadwick Cardinal Murphy O'Connor read the prayers. In Cambridge there was an insert in the Order of Service, a message from the President of the Pontifical Council for Christian Unity to the Archbishop of Canterbury, who was giving the address, "the Roman Catholic Church mourns a great scholar, a holy witness to the gospel and a true friend." The late Pope John Paul II had given Henry a priestly stole. Ever since the second Vatican Council relationships have been cordial at high level; when St John's representatives were at Christ Church to hand over the Travelling Light I mentioned that the Nuncio was celebrating there that evening, again reflecting improved attitudes between fellow



Christians.

Then there was a letter to the Times last summer from Lord Hylton, co-founder of Ammerdown, headed "Catholic Church can learn from Lambeth." He thought the Catholics should discuss, rather than ignore, certain burning issues. I rarely see the *Continued on page 9*

Times—and my googling skills are rather basic still—so do not know whether any Anglicans listed what we could learn in our turn from Catholics and others.

Certainly at local level we get chances, through Lent Lunches, Genesis, CTB

to make friends and to listen and learn. Unity to me does not imply agreement on all things human and divine but a respect and indeed love for those who do not share our views, extended to those of other denominations and indeed those of other faiths.

And indeed to other Anglicans. A friend once said, "if my sister treated her friends as she treats me she wouldn't have any." Deanery Synod can be as much as a challenge as CTB meetings.

Perhaps this all links in with what Cliff preached about the importance of silence. In mature prayer, not petition but listening to God, other-regarding, not selfregarding there is a link to receptive ecumenism



concentrates on learning, not imposing ones own views and wishes. "Forever incomplete", the talk I heard, concluded with receptive ecumenism, stressing not the differences, nor the obstacles to full communion with the Roman Catholics, but on what is positive and encouraging, so seems a happy fresh expression for Christian unity week?

Week of prayer for Christian Unity 18 –25 January

Reconcile Your People "That they may become one in your hand"

The theme for the 2009 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was selected by a local ecumenical group from South Korea. Members of the group were from the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Korea and the National Council of Churches of Korea. The text they chose for the 2009 celebration is Ezekiel 37:15-19, 22-24a.

God spoke to the Prophet Ezekiel and said "They shall be one in my hand... They will be my people and I shall be their God."

We pray to you for the unity of all Christians According to your will, According to your means, May your Spirit enable us to experience the suffering caused by division To see our sin and to hope beyond all hope. God, you alone are our hope You alone are our hope.

The Churches in Korea have found that this passage in Ezekiel resonates with their own sense of sadness over the division of their own country since the Korean War and have brought some of the insights they have gained to the worship for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

God of diversity, accept our desire for unity; reconcile our divisions but let us glorify you through our diversity; let us know how great you are. Amen



1100 years ... how it started

The Diocese of Bath and Wells was formed in 909 so this year is its eleven hundredth anniversary. In earlier times, bishops of Sherborne had been the spiritual leaders of all of south-west England.

It was too large an area to care for properly, and so the huge diocese was divided. In 909 bishops were appointed to Wells and Crediton. So for 1100 years the people of Somerset have had their own bishop. They took different titles as they moved their headquarters but they had a common aim: to proclaim God to each generation.

PAST HISTORY

Christ Church was built at the end of the 18th Century by the socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship by the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church of that time to provide seating free of charge. Early supporters included the Archbishops of Canterbury and York; the great evangelical campaigner against slavery, William Wilberforce; Philip Pusey, the father of E B Pusey; and Martin Stafford Smith, the godfather of John Keble, who were both founders of the Oxford Movement. The building was designed by the famous Bath architect John Palmer, who was responsible for the completion of the Great Pump Room, Lansdown Crescent and St Swithin's, the parish church of Walcot. In November 1998, the congregation, friends and well-wishers from all over the world celebrated the bicentenary.

MINISTRY

Christ Church is unusual in not being a parish church. Much of the vitality of its life and worship derives from the fact that the congregation comes from all areas of the city and the surrounding districts. Whilst there is no full-time paid vicar, there is a non-stipendiary priest-in-charge, who leads a ministerial team of ordained and lay people. Worship at Christ Church largely reflects the traditions of those responsible for its foundation and the rich diversity of the Church of England as a whole. Thus, preaching and Bible-based teaching is firmly set within a liturgical setting which is best described as liberal and catholic.

SERVICES

The 8am Holy Communion is either Book of Common Prayer (1662) or Common Worship. At 10am the Eucharist is celebrated according to Common Worship. On the first Sunday of each month, there is a full Choral Evensong. A Junior Church and a Crêche cater for the children and young people who attend the 10am service. We hold special all-age services once a month and at festivals such as Easter, Christmas, Mothering Sunday and Harvest.

There are a variety of mid-week activities including Holy Communion at 11am every Wednesday during Lent, followed by lunch). The notice board and the weekly notice sheet provide details of discussion and prayer groups which are held at different times throughout the year. An all-age choir, which rehearses on Friday evenings maintains the much-admired music tradition at Christ Church.
