

Reflections on a month in China

I have recently had the good fortune to spend a month's sabbatical in China. I chose to go there because one sixth (2000) of our students at the University of Bath are Chinese, and I wanted to gain a greater understanding of their culture and to



experience for myself what it is like to be 'out of my comfort zone', in order to better understand their needs and be a better Chaplain for them. Also because the first ever woman Priest in the Anglican Communion, the Reverend Florence Li Tim Oi, ordained in Macau in 1944, was Chinese, and I met her in Canada in 1983 and again in the UK in 1984. And because my late Father once offered his services to the China Inland Mission in the 1930's, but was turned down on grounds of ill health.

The following is something I was asked to write by Fr Eamonn O'Brien, a Catholic Priest who helped to organise the first fortnight of my trip when I was travelling with a group of RC Sisters and Monks, most of whom were also University Chaplains. The Organisation that we went with is called Cultural Exchange with China. My 2nd fortnight I travelled solo, staying with friends and also Church contacts through Churches Together in Britain and Ireland. For those of you who like to know these things, my itinerary was as follows: Beijing; Xi'an; Shanghai; Hang Zhou, Beijing. And here are some of my initial impressions of China:

The beauty of the Beijing Boulevards—the flowers, the cleanliness of the streets was not what I had been expecting. Being able to walk to Tiannamen Square within 40 mins of our hotel, and to find myself in that place of so many horrific images back in 1989, yet to find it today teeming with Chinese tourists, many of whom seemed to want to be photographed with me—I am no super star, simply a tall, blonde, blue eyed western woman! The pollution of the air, especially my final week back in Beijing where at one point I was forced to abandon my principles and take refuge in a McDonalds simply to breathe air conditioned air and have a cold sweet drink, (Chinese food is fabulous, but almost entirely savoury) walking back from visiting the Olympic Opening Ceremony Pandas in their special pen in Beijing Zoo.

The stunning architecture of the Forbidden City—the sheer number of pavilions and pagodas, each larger than the last. The beauty of the Temple of Heaven. The blue sky on the day of the visit to the latter was the only time I saw it in nearly 2 weeks in Beijing.

Landing in an earthquake aftershock at Xi'an and going straight to Mass where the Cathedral precincts, as well as the main park, and the highway verges were packed with brightly coloured tents as the Chinese were scared of sleeping in high rise blocks because of the aftershocks. We slept happily on the 8th floor or our hotel—well 8 is a lucky number in China! Pot Noodle supper—and all the delicious and spicy food. (English food seems SO bland now!)


The inability of Shanghai taxi drivers to find where you were going, even when presented with an address in Mandarin characters—feeling so proud when I learnt how to say 'left' straight ahead' and 'stop' in Mandarin—essential prerequisite for travelling alone. The 10 hour train journey back to Beijing from Shanghai, which left on the dot and arrived at exactly the forecasted time. Travelled first class and it cost less than £30. No restaurant car so I rationed my pack of cereal bars to 1 every 2 hours.

Being driven the WRONG way down a 3 lane high way in Hang Zhou—when our driver realised, she simply did a U turn and continued without so much as a checked breath! Visiting the largest Protestant Church in China in Hang Zhou where they have 4000 in the congregation each Sunday morning. The Church can hold 8000 using the galleries and basement. They have been given more land by the Government at a cheap rate to build an old folks home. This was in stark contrast to the Catholic Sisters in Xi'an, who had been badly beaten when protesting against the government when they tried to take away some of their land that they needed for their social programmes. They regularly feed Lepers and Aids victims.

With the Vice Principal of a Seminary and the former head of the Southern Baptist Church in the USA (a Chinese American) praying over a factory built on former farm land where 'graven images' had been found, and where there had been 'disturbances' and the female owner wanted prayers said. Attending a very charismatic prayer meeting of an Ex Pat Abundant Life American Protestant Church.

The friendliness of the Chinese people, their generosity and desire to help, even when separated by the language barrier. Being whisked down an underground badly lit tunnel on the back of a motorbike with my luggage and no crash helmet, by a 'friend' of the porter, when the taxi driver took me to the coach instead of the train station.

The humidity in Shanghai—least good memory of the trip! The beauty of West Lake in Hang Zhou. Eating Peking Duck. Shredded beef in black bean sauce was my favourite dish. Purchasing a full length pure silk



komono for less than £6 in the silk souk in Beijing, with the aid of my former Chinese student who made sure I was not ripped off! Loos with no doors, or simply bamboo curtains that did not quite meet!

The very vibrant faith of the Chinese people as witnessed in both RC and Protestant Churches in Xi'an, Shanghai, Hang Zhou. The Chinese singing in Shanghai RC Cathedral. The love of the Sisters in Xi'an—in stark contrast to the nervousness of the Sisters in Beijing. Spending an entire day wandering around Bei Lan park and lake and pagodas. Staying in the middle of one of the Hutongs just behind the Confucian temple for final week—taking my friends Pekinese dogs for their night time stroll in the narrow streets. Climbing on the Great Wall—and being surprised at the Englishness of the vegetation there! The ease of travel on the Beijing subway which was so well marked and beautifully air conditioned. Receiving the sacrament at a Mass in a hotel room on 25th floor in Shanghai. Eating breakfast in a revolving restaurant on the 42nd floor.

But perhaps the most abiding memory was the sheer size of the country and the cities. Even a modest town would have a population of 5-7 million, Shanghai has 37.8 million people. And 80% of the population lives in the countryside...

Forgive these rather random thoughts, I am still digesting the whole amazing experience, but I would be happy to talk to you about my travels. It was a great experience, and I am indebted to so many kind and new friends in China – we all have a lot to learn from the faith of the Chinese churches. Thanks to all at Christ Church for your prayers for my travels which really meant a lot to me.

Circuit of Bath Walk 2008 in aid of Julian House

Sunday 28th September

The Circuit of Bath Walk is a spectacular event, in which anyone can participate. The route takes in some of Bath's most beautiful near countryside. Participants will not only enjoy a great day out; they'll also give a welcome boost to the work of Julian House. Two miles up to 20, walkers make the choice, thanks to the unique shuttle bus service, which will run throughout the day between the checkpoints.

The Route

The circular route around the city has been carefully selected so that participants can enjoy the countryside and some spectacular views across Bath. In outline it takes in Upper Swainswick, Solsbury Hill, Bathampton, Monkton Combe, Southstoke, Englishcombe, Newton St Loe, Newbridge & Lansdown Park. There are five start points/checkpoints. Participants will start at their preferred checkpoint and finish at any other checkpoint or the same one if they are completing the whole route.

There is a mixture of terrain: well-used paths/public rights of way, limited sections of roadway, flat ground through to reasonable hills. Maps and instructions will be provided on the day to each walker.



Oh Lord hear my prayer

An Easy Flapjack recipe

- * 4 oz, (110 g)
- * 4 tbsp golden syrup
- * 3 oz (75 g) brown sugar
- * 9 oz (225 g) oats
- * A pinch of salt

Pre-heat your oven to 350F (180C)



Pour the mixture into an oiled 8 x 12in (20 x 30cm) baking tin. Smooth down the top with a fork.

Bake for 15 - 20 minutes. The flapjacks are ready when the mixture is still soft but the top has just started to brown. This will give a moist, chewy flapjack. If you leave them to cook for a few minutes longer, they will be firm and crispy.

Local Ministry Group News Somerset Churches and Chapels, Bike Ride/Walk Saturday, 13th September 2008

Friends of Somerset Churches and Chapels help with the maintenance of our places of worship. Charlcombe has already had one grant and I expect we will be asking for another when the roof is done. This is one of their major fund raising events. The basic idea is to obtain sponsorship from your friends and visit as many churches as you can. Choose your own route. PAST HISTORY

Christ Church was built at the end of the 18th Century by the socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship by the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church of that time to provide seating free of charge. Early supporters included the Archbishops of Canterbury and York; the great evangelical campaigner against slavery, William Wilberforce; Philip Pusey, the father of E B Pusey; and Martin Stafford Smith, the godfather of John Keble, who were both founders of the Oxford Movement. The building was designed by the famous Bath architect John Palmer, who was responsible for the completion of the Great Pump Room, Lansdown Crescent and St Swithin's, the parish church of Walcot. In November 1998, the congregation, friends and well-wishers from all over the world celebrated the bicentenary.

MINISTRY

Christ Church is unusual in not being a parish church. Much of the vitality of its life and worship derives from the fact that the congregation comes from all areas of the city and the surrounding districts. Whilst there is no full-time paid vicar, there is a non-stipendiary priest-in-charge, who leads a ministerial team of ordained and lay people. Worship at Christ Church largely reflects the traditions of those responsible for its foundation and the rich diversity of the Church of England as a whole. Thus, preaching and Bible-based teaching is firmly set within a liturgical setting which is best described as liberal and catholic.

SERVICES

The 8am Holy Communion is either Book of Common Prayer (1662) or Common Worship. At 10am the Eucharist is celebrated according to Common Worship. On the first Sunday of each month, there is a full Choral Evensong. A Junior Church and a Crêche cater for the children and young people who attend the 10am service. We hold special all-age services once a month and at festivals such as Easter, Christmas, Mothering Sunday and Harvest.

There are a variety of mid-week activities including Holy Communion at 11am every Wednesday during Lent, followed by lunch). The notice board and the weekly notice sheet provide details of discussion and prayer groups which are held at different times throughout the year. An all-age choir, which rehearses on Friday evenings maintains the much-admired music tradition at Christ Church.
